It's worth checking with your local gym for similar offers.

Finance software

Personal finance software can help keep track of your bank accounts and investments in one place. Most packages let you plan a monthly budget and analyse where your money goes each month. The best we've tested is Moneydance (http://moneydance. com), but make sure you download the free trial if you are thinking of buying it. The free AceMoney Lite (www.mechcad.net/acemoney) is good if you use one bank for all transactions. See www.which.co. uk/financesoftware.

Free learning Regardless of your income and circumstances, most three- and all four-year-olds are entitled to 12.5 hours of free early years education a week, for 38 weeks a year, with a 'registered provider'.

Providers may include Sure Start children's centres, nurseries and pre-schools. This will rise to 15 hours, delivered flexibly over a minimum of three days a week, across England by next year (some councils may already be delivering the 15 hours). You can't have childcare vouchers as well as tax credits, so you may have to choose between them. If you're receiving tax credits and want to know whether you would be better off with childcare vouchers, see www.hmrc.gov.uk/ calcs/ccin.htm.

Find out about your family

Programmes such as the BBC's *Who do you think you are* have stirred many people's interest in finding out more about the history of their own family.

Family tree software for your computer can help make this easier. If you want a good, solid program for building a family file then Personal Ancestral File 5.2 (PAF) is a good start. It's free and a good introduction to the process. See www.familysearch.org.
