Cheaper books

Book chain Waterstone's is currently holding a sale up to 40% off a range of titles including bestsellers, new releases and crime novels.

These include Barack Obama's Dreams From My Father: A Story of Race and Inheritance, reduced from £8.99 to £4.



Cheaper meals out If you dine with a friend, you can buy one main meal and get a second for 99p at the Zizzi chain of restaurants between Sunday and Thursday.

Two-for-one meal If you are quick you can take advantage of a two-forone offer on main meals at Pizza Express (the cheaper of the two dishes is free).

The deal ends on Friday, 24 May and is available between Sunday and Friday.



Free Wi-Fi The list of high-street venues offering free Wi-Fi internet access is expanding all the time. Many branches of Starbucks, McDonald's and Costa Coffee, Pret a Manger and JD Wetherspoon's pubs let you use your wireless laptop free of charge. Websites such as www.myhotspots.co.uk and wifi.lycos.co.uk are good for current lists. Free music online There has been a lot of fuss about people illegally listening to music online.

However, a service launched recently allows you to listen legitimately and at no cost. Spotify (www.spotify.com) is an online music streaming service. This means that as long as you have a broadband internet connection, all you have to do is log on to the website to play music that it carries. Unlike iTunes and similar services, none of the music is actually downloaded to your computer or stored on it.

The service is legal and free as the artists are paid royalties for the music you choose to listen to. Major record labels that have signed up to have their music distributed through Spotify include Universal, EMI, Warner Music and AMG.

Cheaper fares Megabusplus, a new transport service, offers fares from £1 for journeys between Yorkshire cities and towns such as York, Leeds and Harrogate to London. Unusually the journey is by bus between Yorkshire and East Midland's Parkway Train Station, then by train to London. Journey times are longer than for a train-only service (but a lot cheaper) and significantly quicker than taking the coach. For more, see www.megabusplus.com.

Free films to download

You can download films free and legally at the Internet Movie Archive (www. archive.org/details/movies and films)

The films that are available to download include classic such as Alfred Hitchcock's The Man Who Knew Too Much (pictured left) and George Romero's Night of the Living Dead, along with more curious items, such as old advertisements and public information broadcasts.

Use less water As part of a government scheme to reduce the amount of energy we use, a free eaga ShowerSmart is available to selected eligible homes. The idea of it being free is so that the government and energy suppliers can work towards achieving energy-saving targets.

The eaga ShowerSmart is suitable for all non-electric showers and regulates the flow rate of a shower to 7.8 litres a minute - the equivalent of a powerful electric shower

For mains-pressure showers (where hot water comes from a combi-boiler or similar), this saves both water and the

associated energy with heating hot water. It is claimed that, for a two-person household, the eaga ShowerSmart will typically save more than 12,000 litres per vear. cut carbon emissions by a tonne of CO2 over its lifetime and save about £20 on gas and £20 on water bills (where metered) a year.

For the average family, this would equate to savings of about £30 off their gas bills and over £30 off their water bills (where metered) per year.

Following on from last month's feature on local libraries, it is worth pointing out a little-known free national enquiry service.

Free information

A trained librarian is available online 24 hours a day, seven days a week to answer any question you care to ask, at www.askalibrarian.org.uk.

You can ask any question you like from the most technical to the most whimsical.

The service has been used by people researching their family history or just looking for an answer to a crossword clue.

There are two ways that you can ask your question online. Using instant messaging you can talk to a librarian in real time or you can get your answer back by email - during a live session library staff can send web pages relating to your information.

The service was commissioned by the Museums, Libraries and Archives Council.
