

# NEED TO KNOW

Two key choices await you when choosing a new vac. First, you need to decide between upright and cylinder. Your next choice is whether to opt for a bagless or bagged model.

## **CYLINDERS**

With cylinders, you push the nozzle around and drag the body of the machine behind you. Their main advantage is that it's easy to clean under and around furniture or on stairs. Cylinders also tend to be quieter than uprights and, according to our annual reliability survey, break down less. However, most cylinders struggle with cleaning pet hair unless motorised rotating brush heads are provided.

## UPRIGHTS

With uprights, the cleaning head is at the base of the machine and you push the entire vac along. Uprights are your best bet for pet hair but, in our tests, have been outclassed by cylinders in other cleaning tasks. Nevertheless, some people prefer pushing an upright when cleaning large expanses of floor.

## **BAGLESS OR BAGGED**

The obvious advantage of a bagless cleaner is that you don't have to buy dust bags. This saves pennies and earns you environmental brownie points. However, emptying the dust container can be messy and it's easy to spill dust – a big problem for allergy sufferers.

FILTERS Most vacuum cleaners, including this Bosch, have two



filters: one to protect the motor from getting blocked, the other to prevent dust particles escaping through the exhaust. We change the filters before each test to ensure optimum performance. At home, you need to change or clean filters regularly (above) – at least annually – to ensure that the cleaner works efficiently. Spare filters are often included in replacement packs of bags – manufacturers' or specialist websites are another good source.



allergens but, that aside, there's little to fault with this machine. What's more, it's a great bargain at  $\pounds129$  from John Lewis.

The **Miele (2)** is top of the range in the S4 compact series, from which we recommend three Best Buys. This version has superior features such as an optional turbo brush head. This head helps the vac do a great job on all floor surfaces and, like the Bosch (1), it sucks up pet hair a treat. It's great on carpets, but first class on wooden or laminate floors, leaving them virtually spotless.

You'll enjoy using this machine, too. Miele has added a new specially shaped 'comfort' handle to this version – designed to help you steer the floorhead and take pressure off your wrist. Meanwhile, its compact size helps make it one of the best we've tried on stairs.

In elegant 'polar ice' shade, this Miele (2) costs £165 from Miller Brothers or online.

Slightly bigger than the compact range, the **Miele (3)** is another machine for the company to feel proud of. It's the entry-level model in Miele's S5 series and offers excellent all-round cleaning capabilities, being particularly proficient on wooden and laminate floors. As

## **BEST BUYS**

For this test, we've changed the way we decide total test scores. Ideally, every vac should be versatile enough to use on any floor surface. However, some homes have only wooden floors, some have carpets throughout and others have a mixture. So our Best Buys must now provide top-notch cleaning on at least one floor surface, with no significant flaws. They also need to be excellent at retaining the dust they pick up: lower-scoring models are often those with poor filtration that lets dust seep back into the room.

In addition, we award our Best Buy tag only to brands which have a good reputation in our annual reliability survey.

## **CYLINDERS**

The only brands which are consistently ticking all these boxes are Miele and Bosch. Their high standards mean that few competitors have joined them in recent years' Best Buy line-ups.

First up is one of two models from Bosch. The highly impressive burgundy-coloured **Bosch (1)** gives great results on wooden floors and doesn't disappoint on carpet or laminate, either. As a 'ProPets' model, it comes with a handy turbo brush accessory: a rotating brush head which is great for picking up pet hair.

The cleaner is really easy to use, too. Changing bags and filters is quick and easy and manoeuvring the appliance on stairs is a breeze. It's not as good as other cleaners at retaining

## ACCESSORIES

As well as for cleaning floors, you might also want to use your vacuum cleaner on upholstery or curtains. And although most vacs clean very close to the edge of a room, it's amazing how many specks of dirt lurk by skirting

boards. Happily, most vacs have handy extra nozzles and brushes to use in awkward areas. The combination provided with this Miele is typical: a furniture nozzle, dusting brush and a crevice nozzle. They're all cleverly stored inside the machine but you can also clip them to the hose for easier access.

it's the most basic model, it doesn't have fancy extras such as a turbo brush but it still did a pretty good job on pet hair. It's outstanding at retaining cat and dog allergens if this is a concern for you. This cleaner, in sophisticated black, costs £139 from Comet and John Lewis.

With its 'corn yellow' colouring, the **Miele (4)** is certainly less subtly shaded and lacks the stylish revamped look of its brandmates. This is Miele's self-declared most basic model but, with fantastic cleaning results across the board, it has all the brand's classic hallmarks. And it's a stupendously good bargain at just £89 online.

Next up is the lemon-yellow **Miele (5)**, at £119 from Comet and John Lewis. This is the entry-level model in the S4 range – it lacks the dusting brush accessory and has a standard, not a turbo, brush head. It's no slouch, though, leaving laminate and wooden floors speck free and doing a good job on carpets as well. Pet hair is more of a challenge as this machine has no turbo brush, but it copes better than many cylinders. What's more, it's the quietest of the Miele family.

The second **Bosch (6)** doesn't have a turbo brush, so can't quite

match the success on carpets and with pet hair as the ProPets (1) version. It is, however, better at retaining allergens and gets fantastic results on laminate and wooden floors. Otherwise, both Bosch Best Buys are similar, with unusually quiet motors and a helpful carry handle. This version comes in dark blue and is attractively cheap at just £90 from Argos.

Finally, for £156 from Miller Brothers, you can buy the Miele (7) - the parquet version of the popular S4 range. This machine includes a separate brush for cleaning parquet. The parquet brush has soft rollers and brushes designed not to damage delicate floors. It's great on carpet, too, and copes fine with pet hair, so is far more versatile than its name implies.

## **UPRIGHTS**

It's been some time since we've had a Best Buy upright to recommend. The Sebo (22) is certainly a quirky option, with carpet-sweeper looks firmly stuck in the 1950s. If you don't fancy the navy colour shown, perhaps the alternative burgundy and cream check or orange and purple 'fun' version are more your bag. But ignore this vac's odd exterior, as its internal workings are pretty impressive. Its main strength is on laminate but it's also a real star at cleaning pet hair from carpet. And unusually for an upright, it negotiates stairs admirably. You can also slide it under furniture and detach the main cleaning head to carry round the suction unit. All this, plus Sebo's top-notch reputation for reliability. It's £229 from John Lewis.

Our table also includes two excellent uprights from Dyson – models 20 and 21. Both are great cleaners but our annual survey shows that Dyson cleaners are unreliable, so we can't make either model a Best Buy.

## DON'T BUY

Few cylinder cleaners are universally good at all tasks but some are a poor bet for any job. The Dirt Devil (17) is very poor on all surfaces while the Panasonic (18) and Proline (19) performed well only on laminate floors. While none is too pricey, we don't think you should buy them.

## UPRIGHTS AND RELIABILITY

In our recent tests, we've struggled to find Best Buy uprights. In technical tests only models from Dyson have done well – a brand that fares badly in our annual reliability survey. This upright, however, is from Sebo - a brand that's been in our above-average category for brand reliability for several years. And it's the second most popular brand of upright, with nearly 70 per cent of owners happy to recommend it.
