

Pay-as-you-go mobiles

All PAYG deals are not created equal – switching can save you money, and you may end up with a better service

alf of all Which? members have a pay-as-you-go (PAYG) mobile. It's clear that this kind of deal keeps costs down if you don't use your phone enough to justify paying a fixed monthly fee.

A survey of 5,051 Which? online panel members in January and February 2009 revealed that you spend an average of around £5.50 a month on PAYG credit or top-ups, while pay-monthly customers on a contract spend four times as much (around £22 a month).

But if you want to move to a PAYG phone, or switch providers to get a better deal, it's not always easy to decide which package to go for. To help you choose, we've set out the latest results of our member survey on customer satisfaction with PAYG services opposite, together with a comparison of tariffs from eight popular providers.

We found even 'low users' of PAYG (see 'Using the tables', opposite) could shave around £20 off their annual bill by switching from the most expensive provider to Asda's cheap flat-rate tariff. And for moderate to heavy users, savings could run into hundreds of pounds if you switch.

Is PAYG right for you?

Some PAYG users in our survey said they use nearly 300 call minutes and send

more than 100 texts a month. We'd recommend that these 'heavy users' consider a pay-monthly deal to save money.

'Sim-only' one-month contracts work with your existing handset. Prices start at less than £10 a month for 150 minutes and 300 texts (from O2). Or, if you don't mind an 18-month tie-in, Virgin Mobile's £8.50 pay monthly deal offers 100 minutes, 100 texts and a free handset.

If you're a heavy user but prefer to stick with PAYG, carefully choosing your provider and incentives can cut costs, though making the most of incentives (such as 'free texts' in exchange for a minimum top-up) can be complicated. We've looked at PAYG deals and handsets in more detail on pages 43 to 45.

In our mobile satisfaction survey, Which? members gave Tesco's service the highest overall score (69%).

Tesco's flat rate isn't that cheap, but calls and texts are half price to five nominated phone numbers. Calling voicemail costs 10p a minute; it's 20p a call to speak to a customer service adviser.

Money savers

■ Tesco's incentives are worth a look for heavy users — if you spend at least £10 a month you can benefit from 'free credit'. If you top up by £10, you get another £10 of credit. Top up by £15, and you'll get £30 of extra credit — so even if (like our heavy users) you make up to £45 worth of calls and texts, you may only pay £15. Numbers starting 08 and 09 and international calls/ texts are excluded.

The free credit is valid for a month – and you can get only one lot of free credit per month. If you top up by at least £10 twice in a month, this will generate 'free' credit for the next month. Existing Tesco mobile customers must opt in to Tesco's 'free' credit, but once you've opted in, the freebies apply every time you top up by the required amount.

PAYG PROVIDERS UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

Tesco comes top in our satisfaction survey

For the fourth year running, Tesco is our members' favourite PAYG provider, according to our survey.

Big players Vodafone, T-Mobile and Orange perform poorly. Like O2, they score badly for cost.

Which? members rated Tesco and Fresh (a PAYG service from the Carphone Warehouse that's no longer available to new customers) better than most for cost.

When we calculated the monthly cost for two typical types of PAYG user with eight providers (see table far right), Tesco did well.

Our costs exclude minimum top-up incentives, as with low to moderate use there's no guarantee you'd regularly top up by enough to take full advantage – but we've noted where incentives could save cash.

Tesco was denied the low-cost crown by market newcomer, Asda. Asda and 3 weren't used by enough respondents for us to give them a customer score.

We also looked at costs for a 'heavy user' of PAYG (297 minutes and 122 texts a month, spread across 22 days out of the month with two calls on each day). As costs vary so much depending on providers' incentives, we've not compared these costs directly. See our provider details for how to save as a heavy user.

Although Virgin Mobile was second favourite overall in our survey, it achieved the highest PAYG customer service rating.

O2 comes mid-table in our survey, although customers aren't very satisfied with cost. O2's standard rates are identical regardless of tariff. Voicemail costs 15p a call and speaking to an 02

In our survey, Vodafone performs poorly across the board.

It charges 20p a minute, including voicemail, and 10p a text. Speaking to a customer service adviser costs 25p.

Money savers

Vodafone has top-up incentives that could benefit moderate and heavy users.

You must opt in to benefit. Text Unlimited gives you free evening, weekend or anytime texts when you top up by £5, £10 or £30 in a month respectively. This would reduce a heavy user's monthly cost from more than £70 to around £60. If you use your mobile a lot

at weekends, you could benefit from Vodafone's 'free week-

ends'. Spending £2.50 in the week gets you free texts the following weekend; spend £5 and weekend calls are free too. Free calls to other networks are limited to an hour in total.

You can buy text/minute bundles that could cut costs if you use them all – 100 anytime minutes cost £15 for 30 days. You can combine bundles with minimum top-up incentives.

Check out "Vodafone family' if you have close contacts who also use Vodafone.

All Orange customers can take advantage of 'Orange Wednesdays' – two-for-one cinema tickets every Wednesday.

If you send lots of texts or make frequent calls, you could save money by choosing the 'Dolphin' or 'Canary' PAYG tariffs. It doesn't offer incentives for using your mobile phone in a certain way or topping up by a minimum amount, so although it's reasonable value for heavy users at just under £30 a month, they might find a better deal elsewhere. Heavy users can cut costs using one of 3's 'Stretch' options. For example, Stretch 10 provides 100 call minutes or texts, plus an extra 100 minutes to other 3 mobiles, for £10. Text bundles can cut costs for moderate users. A Sim card without a handset costs £9.99, including £10 credit. 3 sells one Best Buy phone: the Sony Ericsson K660i (74%, £59).

Best Buy phones

There's a huge range of pay-as-you-go phones to choose from. We pick five Best Buys under £70

t used to be the case that if you wanted a decent mobile phone, you had to sign on the dotted line and take out a lengthy contract. If you opted for a pay-as-yougo (PAYG) deal, you were restricted to a small range of very basic handsets.

That's no longer true. You can now buy great PAYG handsets that perform well and are packed with the latest technology. Even Apple's iPhone is available on PAYG, although at £343 it costs more than most of us would want to spend. Here, we've picked five of our favourite Best Buy PAYG handsets. These include music and camera phones, an internet-capable handset, and the greatvalue Nokia 2610. At just £10, this handset is an incredible £333 cheaper than Apple's mobile phone.

Easy-to-use handsets

Mobiles can be tricky to operate if you have sight, hearing or dexterity problems – follow our advice to find a suitable model

The five Best Buy handsets that we've featured in this report are all fantastic phones, but they won't appeal to everybody. If you have a hearing, vision or dexterity problem, you probably won't need a to be. Although a smaller phone will be easier to carry, its display may be hard to see and its controls may be fiddly.

Look for a handset with good-sized keys, a large, clear screen, and functions that are clear and simple to use.

Specialist models

Instead of buying a conventional mobile phone, you could go for a specialist handset, such as the Doro HandleEasv 328 (£100, pictured left) and 330 (£130), or the Amplicom PT M5000 (£100). These phones often include useful features such as extra loud ringtones and emergency buttons. However, specialist phones can be

expensive and are

often available only from specialist retailers such as Matobmobile (see 'Contacts', opposite).

Hearing aids

Some mobile phones can cause interference with older, analogue hearing aids. You'll experience less interference with in-the-canal aids than behind-the-ear aids, because they are smaller and located further away from the phone when you use it. When choosing a mobile, test it in a shop before buying it to find out whether it does interfere with vour hearing aid.

If you have old analogue hearing aids and experience some interference, a handsfree kit may help. They work with almost any hearing aid that has a 'T' setting.

The excellent music player is one of the main attractions of this reasonably priced phone. It also has an FM radio, with RDS for station information, and

you can save up to 2GB of music on the supplied micro-SD card. The large display is handy for viewing photos, although snaps taken with the camera are nothing special. It's simple to use and performs very well as a phone – durability, call quality and reception levels are first rate. It's cheapest at Orange (through Phones4U). WE LIKE At just 73q, it's
