# **DVD** recorders

# **NEED TO** NOV

A DVD recorder lets you record from TV – with better picture and sound quality than a VCR.

#### **RECORDING FORMATS**

Different machines work with different types of disc, as shown in the table. **DVD-Ram is the most** versatile: it can be recorded on over and over, and can record and play simultaneously so you can start watching a show before the machine has finished recording it. Unfortunately, DVD-Ram discs won't play in most DVD plavers, DVD+RW and DVD-RW discs can also be recorded on more than once and work with more players than DVD-Ram. If you don't want to re-record, use cheaper, write-once discs – DVD-R or DVD+R, depending on the machine.

#### **COMBINATIONS**

Three models on test combine a DVD recorder with a VCR. This allows you to copy from VCR to DVD and vice versa, but you can't record in both formats at once. None of the models is good enough as either a DVD recorder or VCR to be a Best Buy.

We hope to see the first DVD recorder combined with a personal video recorder (PVR) later this year (see p53 for more about PVRs). You'll be able to use the PVR element to record programmes to the internal hard drive, and the DVD recorder to archive your recordings to DVD discs.

#### LONG PLAY

In standard mode, you can record two hours of programmes on a DVD disc. Long-play mode increases capacity to three or four hours but picture and sound suffer. This Panasonic has much worse picture quality in long-play mode. The combis can also make long-play recordings in VCR mode, fitting six hours on to a three-hour tape. This also adversely affects quality.

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## **BEST BUYS**

Most of the DVD recorders on test work well. Our Best Buys have the best picture and sound quality, and are relatively easy to use.

The **Panasonic** (1) is available for £200 from Comet. It uses DVD-R and the versatile DVD-Ram format but is short on features, with no resume or bookmarking. It produces great quality picture and sound from both pre-recorded and self-

recorded discs, though picture quality is much worse if you use the long-play mode. It's one of the easiest DVD recorders to use, though still more complicated than a video cassette recorder.

The **Sony** (2) uses DVD+R, DVD+RW, DVD-R and DVD-RW discs. Playback picture quality isn't as good as the Panasonic but it's still a good all-rounder. It costs £300 from Argos and Index.

VIDEOPLUS



With VideoPlus, you set up recordings by simply keying in a code from the listings pages Of the Best Buys, this Panasonic and the Sony (2) both come with VideoPlus, which makes recording from TV easy. Simply type in the relevant code from your TV listings guide, and the recorder sets start and stop times. All the machines with VideoPlus also have the programme delivery control (PDC) feature. After you've entered the VideoPlus code, they pick up signals from the broadcaster, and will alter timings if the schedule changes or the previous programme overruns. PDC works only with some analogue (and no digital) channels.
