Micro hi-fi systems can save you space and money – and the latest systems can even connect to the internet

Micro hi-fi systems are a popular choice for the home. They're stylish, don't take up much space, and offer an easy, one-stop solution for your audio needs.

You don't have the hassle of deciding what separate amplifier, tuner, CD and speakers to buy – they all come neatly packaged together in one unit, simple to set up and get going, plus you can usually control the whole system from a single remote control. Crucially, you needn't compromise on audio quality if you choose carefully – our Best Buys are easy to use and sound great.

Micro hi-fi models are also benefiting from a range of new features. Most come with DAB radio and many have USB ports or iPod docking stations for hooking up an MP3 player or memory stick. Others have memory card slots that will accept an SD card, and three have massive hard-disk drives that can store thousands of MP3 audio tracks.

Three models we tested – Denon's D-F103HRDAB (2) and S-52DAB (16) and the Philips WACS7500 (10) – can connect to the web and access a host of internet radio stations. Tuning into the likes of Radio Kazakhstan could be a welcome change from Classic FM.

The iSymphony V1BLUEe (17) features a Bluetooth wireless link so that the main

unit can connect wirelessly to the supplied iPod docking station. This means you can conveniently locate the iPod dock close to the listener. The link can also be used to transmit music to a suitable mobile phone, Bluetooth headset or other mobile device.

For a new concept in home hi-fi, consider the Philips WACS7500 (10) and WAC3500D (6) systems. Their main units contain harddisk recorders that will store hundreds of CDs; they can also stream music wirelessly to up to five remote music stations around your house.

How we test



What we're listening for, and how we find the best micro hi-fi

Music variety show

At the core of our testing are our stringent listening tests. Our panel of five experts listens to various audio tracks, including classical from Suppé (Light Cavalry), jazz (Jacques Loussier) and female vocal from Mary Black. We also use spoken word tracks featuring male and female voices. Each track is chosen to put the systems through their paces and highlight any flaws.

We try each system with good-quality budget speakers to see whether the sound improves. If it does, it shows that the supplied speakers limit the sound quality.

Any iPod dock or other MP3 connection is assessed for sound quality.

In addition to this we perform more than 50 technical tests and check more than 150 features.

Our ergonomics experts also try out each model's various functions and features, assessing how easy and intuitive they are.

New features such as internet radio or wireless streaming are given a thorough examination so we can pass judgement.



Norrie Curtis 36, chartered surveyor

Norrie Curtis and his partner David, 40, from Stroud in Gloucestershire, have a Philips Streamium C700 wireless music system installed in their home. Their entire collection of 500 CDs has been relegated to the loft as they've downloaded each one to the 40GB hard disk of the main unit.

With their music collection now stored centrally, they can play it back directly from the main unit in the kitchen, or wirelessly stream it to two remote stations placed in the sitting room and study.

Norrie can scroll through artists and albums to find whatever music he wants to play, create playlists or just listen to a random selection in 'shuffle' mode. It's changed the way that Norrie listens to music. 'I'm much less album-orientated now,' he says, 'and far more spontaneous about what I listen to when scrolling through the listings.'

Norrie thinks that sound quality from the main unit and music stations is good and he is very happy with his purchase. 'I'd definitely choose this type of music system again,' he says.

This stylish three-part system has brushed-aluminium front panels and fluorescent displays, coupled with light-



coloured wood-finish speakers. Our experts loved the way it sounded, saying it offered 'a marvellous, warm, punchy sound'. It has a DAB tuner and all the necessary connections for attaching a separate recorder. Setting it up was fiddly but, once done, it was easy to use. It's cheapest online and at independents.

WORTH KNOWING The system uses two remote controls and needs to be plugged in with three mains leads.

This modern-looking, onebox system is available in

shiny 'piano' black, with matching speakers that deliver the goods. Its DAB tuner has some advanced features; it receives and displays electronic programme guide listings, and can pause, rewind and record live radio to an external memory card. It also has an advanced facility called 'intellitext' that gives you on-demand extras such as sports results. Our assessors liked its front-panel controls and on-screen menus. Cheapest at John Lewis. WORTH KNOWING This system

gobbles up 10 watts of power when left in standby mode.

This hi-tech box of tricks has several clever features. It has a DAB radio and, unusually, it incorporates a 40GB hard



drive that can record tracks from CD or an MP3 player, plus an ethernet connection for transferring audio files or listening to internet radio. Our experts liked the way it sounded and praised its 'good quality and dynamics'. Setting it up takes a while, and the lavout of the remote control is confusing, as is the menu system. Cheapest at John Lewis. WE LIKE This is a great system if the fancy features appeal to you. If not, go for one of the cheaper Best Buys

66% JVC EX-A10 £520

This silver two-box system comes with speakers featuring wooden cones that have been soaked in



sake. The theory is that the sake makes the wood soft and easily manipulated, preventing it from cracking when shaped. We can't comment on whether this is strictly necessary, but we can report that this system sounds very good with these speakers - better than with our alternative speakers - so maybe there's something to it. It has a decent FM/MW tuner (but not DAB) and we found it easy to set up and use. It's cheapest online and at independents. WORTH KNOWING This is the only system we tested that comes with a good-quality DVD player.

This smart-looking system **The Denon** has two main units in brushed aluminium with large **D-F103HR** a hi-tech box of tricks with several clever features

blue displays. It comes with a DAB radio and all the necessary inputs and outputs for connecting a recorder. Our expert panel thought its sound quality was a notch down from the D-F103HRDAB (2). Setting it up was complicated by the number of wires, and Denon needs to look at its remote control layouts, which are confusing. It's cheapest at Comet and John Lewis.

WE FOUND A decent hi-fi system, but the audio quality can be bettered.

Unsound investment

A micro system that is big on disappointment

The Ministry of Sound MOSMC139IPXI (18) finished at the bottom the pile. The FM/MW tuner was the worst we tested and CD sound quality was poor - 'unrefined and harsh' was our expert listeners' verdict.

We also found it a pain to use - the instructions are wordy and poorly

translated and we found the front panel layout confusing. The remote control is no better, with poor layout, labelling and restricted angle of use.

It may be cheap, but it's definitely not cheerful. Don't go within earshot of this Don't Buy system.

Best for audio quality

TEAC REF300DAB MK3 £500 If hi-fidelity is of overriding importance, look no further than this Teac (1). Our experts thought it sounded 'marvellous'. And it's our top-scoring system overall.

Best for audio around the home

PHILIPS WAC3500D £300 It narrowly missed out on being a Best Buy but the WAC3500D (6) can generate good sound from its main unit and wirelessly link to up to five (optional) remote music stations around your house. You can control it so that the music 'follows you' as you move from room to room or broadcasts to all stations at the same time, filling your home with your favourite tunes.

Best for internet radio

DENON D-F103HRDAB £999 If tuning into thousands of radio stations from around the world appeals, then this Best Buy from Denon (2) fits the bill. It also produces great sound that's up there with the best.

Best on a budget

TEAC CR-H257I £160 If your wallet won't stretch to one of our Best Buys, then this Teac (7) is worth considering. It's not a great audio performer, but the quality won't offend your ears and it's one of the easiest systems to use.

Step-by-step guide How to download your CD collection to a music system with a hard drive



Load a CD into the drawer and press play. The system will identify the CD using the cataloguing system that it has downloaded from the internet and stored in its memory.



A track listing will appear. Press Mark/Unmark to select/deselect those tracks you want to record.



Press record to start 'ripping' the CD to the hard drive at high speed. Tracks are stored by default in MP3 format at 128kbps (near CD quality). You can select higherquality bit rates (up to 320 kbps) but this will take up more disk space.

Repeat steps one to three with other CDs.
