Best Buy cameras for summer holidays

Our tests reveal the best digital cameras for your travels, plus tips on sharing your holiday photos online

holiday is a great time to experiment with photography. The latest digital cameras are designed to help you take better pictures than ever, and are packed with useful features that make it easier to capture some great shots.

You can pick up an ultraslim camera for a very reasonable price, and these compact models are easy to slip into your pocket while out-andabout on holiday. Even slim digital cameras often have image stabilisation and face detection technology, making photography easier. If you fancy getting closer to far-off subjects, it's worth considering a superzoom bridge camera. With impressive lens magnifications, models such as the Best Buy Canon SX1 IS are great for photographing wildlife from afar.

Most digital cameras come with scene modes – selecting a scene mode quickly gives the ideal picture settings for certain photography conditions, such as a sunset or starry night sky.

When you return from your travels, there's plenty you can do with your digital pictures. Photo-sharing websites such as Flickr and Facebook let you create online photo albums for sharing with your friends. This is a great way of sharing pictures without having to attach large files to emails, and friends and family can leave comments next to your photos.

We've tested 22 of the latest digital cameras to help you choose the right model for you and your holiday. Checklist

What to look for when buying a digital compact camera for use on holiday

Resolution

High resolutions (measured in megapixels) let you enlarge pictures when printing.

Wide lens angle
The small number on
the zoom range (such as
28-140mm); the smaller this
is, the easier it will be to take
group and landscape shots.
Tele lens angle

The large number on the zoom range; the bigger this is, the further you can zoom on distant subjects.

Memory card

Not all memory cards will be compatible with every camera, so check before you buy.

Image stabiliser A sensitive mechanical

adjustment that helps the camera compensate for shaky hands.

Anti-blur

A digital method of reducing blurring. It's not as effective as a mechanical image stabiliser, though.



78% Canon PowerShot SX10 IS £322

A superzoom camera with a powerful x20 lens, a great range of manual controls and impressive image quality. Colour reproduction is good, and it performs well in bright daylight and indoors. It's ideal for shooting faraway holiday scenery thanks to the huge lens, though this makes it heavier than most, at 712g. The zoom starts from a wide angle of 28mm, which is helpful for fitting in wider landscapes.

It has an image stabiliser, an electronic viewfinder, manual focus and priority modes for aperture and shutter speed. It's very quick in operation, and is ready to go just two seconds after switching on. WE LIKE You can adjust the strength of the microphone and its wind filter when using the camera's video mode.

74% Canon Digital Ixus 870 IS £215

Slim, stylish and speedy, this Canon boasts impressive image quality for a camera of this class. At just 181g, it will slip easily into your pocket or handbag. The x4 optical zoom is relatively small, but it starts at a decent wide angle of 28mm, and there's an optical image stabiliser built in. It gives a good performance in low light, though it handles bright daylight photography far better, with sharp images and good colour reproduction. The monitor is clear and sharp, letting you view pictures and movies with ease. It's ready to go 1.64 seconds after switching on, and there's a lag of only two seconds between shots. WORTH KNOWING You can raise the ISO to 3200 to make it sensitive in low light, but this limits resolution to 2Mp.

74% Canon PowerShot SX1 IS £450

This outstanding Canon isn't cheap, but it's a powerful camera with a mighty x20 zoom lens, plenty of features and a huge degree of manual control. However, as with the Canon SX10 IS, the 28-560mm lens makes it relatively heavy. You can flip and rotate the screen to change its viewing angle, and there's an electronic viewfinder. Pictures taken in natural light are sharply focused with great colour reproduction, but it doesn't handle low light too well. Macro performance is extremely good, so you'll be able to take great close-up shots, and video quality is better than most. It's fast, too – you'll have to wait only around 1.6 seconds between shots. WE LIKE You can attach an external flash using the camera's hot-shoe connector – unusual on non-DSLRs.

Top tips for taking holiday photos Make sure you capture great holiday memories with our guide

KNOW YOUR CAMERA

Read your manual thoroughly and experiment with settings before you set off. If your camera has manual functions, adjust shutter speeds, apertures, ISO settings and features such as white balance to get a feel for how they affect photos.



SCENE MODES

These give the ideal settings for getting the best pictures in certain conditions, such as a sunset mode to help bring out the reds and yellows.

CLOSE-UPS

Rather than relying on wide shots capturing entire scenes,

try some detailed close-ups of interesting subjects – most cameras have a macro mode to help with this.

PHOTOGRAPHING CHILDREN

Try to avoid standing over children and aiming the camera down. You can get a better shot by crouching low and photographing at their own level.

COMPOSE OFF-CENTRE

Pictures tend to look more pleasing when the subject isn't in the middle. Centre your subject initially to autofocus before panning to capture more background.



70% Casio Exilim EX-FH20 £342

This is another good choice if you want to get closer to your subjects without opting for a DSLR, and it gives a good range of manual controls. The standout feature is the x20 optical zoom, which starts from a wide angle of 26mm – great for wider landscape shots, but it does add to the camera's weight. Picture quality is generally good without being outstanding. Colour reproduction is good too, and the EX-FH20 takes excellent images close up. However, the camera is less impressive in indoor and low-light conditions, where grainy images can be a problem. Our testers were impressed with its video-recording mode.

WE LIKE By setting the video mode to 1,000 frames per second you can play back videos in smooth slow motion. Size 15x8x9.5cm Weight 641g Resolution 9Mp Zoom 26-520mm (x20) Scene modes 18 'Best Shot' plus one user-defined Face detection Yes Cheapest at John Lewis Also available Currys, Jessops



70% Casio Exilim EX-Z400 £225

This great pocket-sized camera weighs just 160g, and has a good range of features. Picture quality is generally impressive, though it's best in bright daylight conditions, where it does a good job of picking up subtle colour contrasts and distinguishing between shadows and highlights. Even in low light the EX-Z400 works well, delivering impressive shots that aren't too grainy. There are an impressive 34 scene modes to experiment with, and a built-in image stabiliser to help reduce blurring, though our tests revealed the improvement to be underwhelming. WORTH KNOWING The EX-Z400 has a very poor macro mode, so this isn't a great camera for detailed close-up photography.

68% Samsung WB500 £200

This Samsung has a large x10 optical zoom lens that lets you get close to distant subjects. The lens starts from an uncommon wide angle of 24mm, which gives you a huge degree of freedom when trying to fit in tight indoor group shots or broad landscapes. Shots are sharply focused and the colour reproduction is particularly accurate in bright daylight, though we found that the WB500's performance flags a bit in dim-light conditions. There's an image stabiliser built in.

WE LIKE The generous 24mm wide angle lens setting lets you fit in broad landscapes or indoor group shots without having to step far back from your subject.

Share holiday photos online Invite family and friends to view your holiday photos for free on Facebook or Flickr

SIGN UP

Signing up to Facebook is free, and there's no limit on the number of photos you can upload. It's also free to create a basic Flickr account, but this limits each user to 100MB of photo uploads per month, a maximum file size of 10MB, and a maximum of three sets of photos. If you're planning to upload a large number of photos, you may be better off using another photo-sharing website, or paying to upgrade to a 'Pro' Flickr account.

UPLOADING

Flickr and Facebook both feature uploading software that you can install quickly onto your computer. This makes it easy to select pictures for uploading. You can organise photos into albums, add captions to your pictures, write descriptions and annotate them to draw attention to points of interest.

SHARING PICTURES

You can make your online albums viewable by anyone, all your friends or select individuals.

STORING PHOTOS ONLINE

With Flickr, photos are resized to fit on the screen, though they're all still saved on Flickr's servers in their original resolution. Other sites, such as Facebook, shrink pictures as you upload them, so make sure you keep the original files elsewhere if you want fullresolution copies – essential for getting quality prints.

WHICH GADGETS DO YOU REALLY NEED?



Digital cameras

Cameraphones

With cameraphones increasing in quality, do you need a digital camera at all?

Cameraphones are becoming increasingly sophisticated, but even the best can't match the performance of a dedicated digital camera.

Some new cameraphones, such as the LG Renoir or the Sony Ericsson C905, boast 8Mp picture resolutions – this is useful if you're enlarging pictures when printing, but great picture quality isn't determined by resolution alone.

POOR LIGHT

The small image sensors built into cameraphones make them poor at capturing pictures in low light, according to Which? tests. Cameraphones rarely feature proper xenon flashes to help in low-light situations, though models such as the LG Renoir are bucking this trend.

ZOOMING IN

Cameraphones also lack optical zoom lenses, limiting you to digital zoom for faraway subjects, which will affect the image quality. The time it takes to autofocus and a slow shutter delay can mean missing more fleeting moments.

STORING PHOTOS

Like digital cameras, most cameraphones store photos as Jpeg files on to a memory card, and transferring these onto a PC or getting prints is generally easy.

VERDICT

Most cameraphones perform well in bright daylight and, if you only have one camera in your party, they're a great backup for taking additional shots.

Camcorders

Can digital cameras double up as quick-and-easy alternatives to camcorders?

Most compact cameras have video modes and can be used instead of a camcorder – but with some limitations.

VIDEO RECORDING

An increasing number of digital cameras, such as the Casio Exilim EX-Z400, boast highdefinition video recording. While this can mean an improved video resolution, there's no substitute for a proper camcorder if you're keen on capturing family videos in the highest possible quality.

DETAIL

The relatively small lenses and image sensors on digital cameras tend to limit the detail of your videos, and subtle colour distinctions, differences in shadow and highlight, and the smoothness of panning shots often disappoint.

SON

Some cameras don't allow you to use the optical zoom while recording videos or, like the Samsung S1070, force you to mute the sound as you do so.

SOUND QUALITY

- 10

The small microphones built into digital cameras often mean the sound quality of your videos will be very poor. Camcorders have superior built-in mics, and usually allow you to attach an external mic for improved sound.

VERDICT

Digital camcorders can't capture still photos to rival a digital camera's, so to get the very best photos and videos of your holiday, you may want to consider packing both devices. USING THE TABLE The more stars the better.

How we test



If you're chasing the sun this summer, it's good to know that most compact digital cameras perform well in bright daylight, doing a good job of picking up colour detail and distinguishing between areas of shadow and highlight.

However, they tend to struggle more in low-light conditions. For this reason, we conduct thorough tests of each camera's low-light performance. Using a specially set up room, we test the cameras against colour and contrast charts under challenging light conditions.

The resulting photographs are then evaluated to determine the accuracy of colour reproduction and the amount of detectable image noise – the grainy speckling effect that can ruin low-light photography.

To test the effectiveness of each camera's flash, we measure how intelligently it adjusts the flash strength in varying light conditions. Flash strength, distribution and reflection are measured in carefully calibrated tests to help you choose the right camera for lighting up your evening shots.
