# Calling the shots

# You needn't pay over the odds for a designer cordless phone when all five of our Best Buys cost less than £80

Cheapskates and design snobs could equally lose out when it comes to finding a good cordless phone, our latest test of 18 models suggests. Although prices ranged from £15 to £265, our Best Buys averaged around £60 – ranging from £35 to £76.

The latest handsets seem to be morphing into mobile phones. Their displays look and feel like a mobile phone, and you can easily upload your mobile phone contacts to them and send and receive text messages with them (see 'What you should look for', below). Signal strengths are now so good you could probably use your handset across the road from your house. So this raises the question – why not dispense with a landline altogether?

We now have more mobile phones than people in the UK, according to First Direct bank – but don't ditch the landline just yet. You're guaranteed a good signal, it's cheaper for people to call you and usually cheaper for you to call them back. And with some cordless models, you can make calls over the net (see below, right). For tips on cutting your phone bill, check out our report on phone bundles (see p20).





#### SAVING MONEY CALLING FRIENDS ABROAD

Helen regularly calls friends in South Africa and the US using her BT landline. We gave her the most expensive Voip phone in our test – the Panasonic BB GT1520E (9), which is tied to an account with Joip. It was easy to set up and use, and Helen called South Africa for a tenth of the cost of using BT. But she couldn't Skype her friends free, and the echo on the line was 'annoying'.

'I wouldn't use the Voip line for everyday calls,' she says.

# One in five of you

Nearly one in five Britons (18 per cent) makes calls over the net, a Which? poll suggests. More than five million of us use Skype, the biggest voice over internet protocol (Voip) provider.

Using Voip can shrink your phone bills through cheaper calls to landlines – especially to overseas numbers – and free calls to friends who are with the same Voip provider. Voip calls can suffer from echoes. But usage is growing fast, with 60 per cent of those we polled saying they might make internet calls in future.

Although people used to make internet calls via their PC with a USB phone or a microphone and headset,

Chatterboxes will love the nearly 16 hours of talk time you get from the excellent battery. Both the phone and the integrated answering machine are easy to use, and the blue backlit display and buttons look funky. You can't send or receive text messages, but it does have speed dial. You'll find it cheapest at Argos, Comet and John Lewis.

WORTH KNOWING Call the phone to access voicemail, but change its Pin from the factory setting.

# **69% BT Domus** £76/100

The stylish BT Domus looks more like a mobile handset than a cordless phone. It's quite pricey, but is packed with

features and is simple to set up and operate. Its range is good, although sound quality on the



answering machine could be better. Its huge phonebook holds 255 numbers, and uploading contacts from your mobile is easy. Cheapest online as a single, otherwise it's Comet.

some cordless phones can make Voip calls too. Each time you pick up the handset you decide whether to call someone over the net or via your landline. The main downsides of Voip cordless models is they can be tricky to set up and the sound can be poor. We tested four Voip handsets in this latest batch (see table, p51), and two for an earlier report (see October 2007, p44). Since Voip is an additional feature, it doesn't count towards total scores.

#### PHILIPS VOIP8411B £97

This sleek, black Philips phone from our October 2007 report (p46) is still our favourite Voip handset. It's easier to use

# than the other five Voip cordless models

we've tested, but it's not quite good enough to be a Best Buy. However, the Voip is easy to set up – there's no software to download. And the phone has a detailed display from which you can access your Voip phonebook and Skype account even when your PC is switched off. **SCORE 59%** 

# How we test

Our experts perform 83 tests to find you the best cordless phone with a clear reception

## Sound quality

We measure noise and distortion, the loudness of the earpiece and how well it reproduces speech.

For the answering machine, we judge the quality of the sound via the internal speaker and on the handset, where applicable. We also judge the sound quality of the message that callers hear when you're out.

## **Signal strength**

We compare reception across nine rooms, several floors and through steel and sandstone walls. And we record the phone's maximum range when clear of obstacles.

All handsets tested could receive calls from at least 280 metres from the base station – in a straight line with no obstructions at all.



## 12 NO ANSWERING MACHINE 64% Panasonic KXTG7200E £35/60/70/95 This great-value phone

lacks the advanced features of some of its rivals – there's no text messages facility and it can't read Sim cards. But the base's simple design mirrors the phone's ease of use. The range is also impressive. Sound quality is first rate, especially when using it hands-free. Cheapest at Argos and John Lewis. **WE FOUND The battery lasts an impressive 22 hours – ideal if you often forget to recharge it.**
