Security essentials

If you go online, it's vital to install software to guard against threats from the internet. We test the latest programs

With so many stories in the media about new threats from computer viruses and online villains trying to break into your computer or dupe you into giving away your bank details, it's a wonder any of us goes online at all. But, provided you install anti-virus software, a firewall (to inspect data entering and leaving your PC) and anti-spyware (to protect against programs that gather information about you), the internet needn't be a scary place.

Just as importantly, though, you'll need to keep your security software up to

date. And if regularly updating all these programs sounds like too much of a housekeeping headache, a security suite

could be just what you're looking for. These software bundles provide every crucial security program in a single, integrated package, which you can set to update automatically in one go.

Nice and easy

If you have a Mac, your choice of security software is simple. Macs are currently far less prone to viruses than Windows PCs, so the built-in firewall that comes with Apple Leopard is all you need for now.

PC owners, on the other hand, will need security software. And it's all very well if the software can track down a virus on your computer, but it's not much good if the program's so complicated that it's hard to work out what you're meant to do about it. Thankfully, all our Best Buy suites do a good job of protecting your PC and don't bamboozle you with confusing messages and alerts.

Free software

Alternatively, rather than forking out about £40 a year for a suite, you could consider downloading free software instead. Our sister magazine *Computing Which?* found several free programs that were just as good at combating threats as the packages you buy off the shelf.

However, there are several aspects to be aware of before you opt for the free security software route – see 'Home free', opposite, for more details.

OUR RESEARCH

We assess how easy it is to install, update and use the software. We expose the programs to viruses and spyware and assess how effective each is at detecting and removing them. Time constraints prevent us from conducting a longterm test of anti-spam programs, but we are able to measure how good the programs are at learning to filter out junk emails.

Best free programs

ZONEALARM FREE A firewall is the most important security program to have, and ZoneAlarm is the best of the freebies. You can choose any of the Best Buy anti-virus programs in 'Home free', opposite, and use Windows Defender for your anti-spyware.

Easiest to use MICROSOFT WINDOWS LIVE ONECARE £40

All our Best Buy suites are easy to use, but Microsoft Windows Live OneCare is the easiest for those who are familiar with the look and feel of computers with Microsoft Windows.

Best extra anti-spyware windows DEFENDER FREE

Install at least two antispyware programs. Got a suite? Add Windows Defender. Otherwise, combine Windows Defender and the second-placed Spybot Search and Destroy. (Activate real-time protection on one program only.)



Home free Free security programs may require a little extra effort, but they can be just as effective as paid-for suites

Free security programs are better suited to confident computer users. Unlike paid-for security software, you don't usually get access to a telephone helpline and have to download, install and set each program's updates separately. However, our tests found that the Best Buy free software did as good a job of protecting your PC as the paid-for suites.

It's crucial to make sure you download the right program - see 'Contacts', opposite, for website details.

Our Best Buy programs

Of the free anti-virus programs on test, AVG, Avast! 4 and Avira AntiVir are the easiest to use - although some of the menus are a little tricky to find your way around.

Microsoft Defender is the simplest free anti-spyware

program on test. It offers realtime protection too, so, as well as cleaning spyware off your PC, it prevents it from getting in.

We recommend installing more than one anti-spyware program, as no single program will detect everything. But make sure you activate realtime protection on only one of the programs, as they could conflict with each other.

Windows XP's built-in firewall doesn't check outgoing data, and the one that comes with Vista isn't as comprehensive as ZoneAlarm - the best free firewall we tested. ZoneAlarm will check incoming and
