# **Digital radios**

# NEED TO KNOW

Digital radio, also known as DAB (digital audio broadcasting), offers an increased choice of stations. You get five extra BBC channels, including BBC7 (comedy and drama), and extra pop channels such as 1Xtra. There are more commercial and local stations, too: if you're a head-banger there's Planet Rock, while intellectuals might enjoy the literaturecentric One Word.

A small screen on the radio displays information about what you're listening to, such as a description of the type of music the station plays, contact phone numbers to ring the studio, or even <u>track names</u>.

Digital radios are now available as hand-held models, so you can listen digitally when you're out. If you want a table-top model just for use at home, there's a larger selection.

# COVERAGE

Currently 85 per cent of the country can receive digital radio. Visit www. digitalradionow.com and type in your postcode to see whether you can. Some areas have better reception than others, so you may need an external DAB aerial (see 'DAB aerials', opposite). If you opt for a hand-held model, you may wander out of the DAB area, so it's worth buying one with an FM tuner as well. DAB reception can be patchy compared with FM if you're moving quickly, on a train, for example.

# **TABLE-TOP**

The **Pure (1)** is the bestsounding digital radio around; it plays all types of music and speech well, with good bass and clarity. You can find it in Argos, Currys, Dixons, John Lewis and Miller Brothers for £130. It remains best on test, despite some stiff competition from the Roberts.

The **Roberts** (2), £120 from virtually everywhere, lets you pause and rewind live radio (see 'Rewind live radio', opposite). It's uninspiring to look at, falling unsatisfactorily between the 'classic' look of the wood-clad Pure models and the contemporary hi-tech appearance of the Sony models. However, it delivers the goods in other areas, with great sound quality and an easy-to-use design. You can also put batteries in it if you want to take it out and about.

The cheaper **Pure (3)** has ten pre-sets so you can easily switch to the digital stations you like. Sound quality is good, considering that there's only one speaker. You can buy an extra matching speaker for  $\pounds$ 30 if you want stereo sound. One drawback is that the sound can distort at louder volumes. This Pure model costs  $\pounds$ 100 at Argos, Currys and John Lewis.

The Intempo (4) has good sound quality, according to our expert panel. The FM reception is particularly good, though there is a slight highpitched whistling sound in the background during some FM broadcasts. It's around £90 in John Lewis and Miller Brothers.

The **Sony** (5), £130 from Comet, Currys and Dixons, isn't a bad first-time effort from Sony but it doesn't really have the sound quality or ease of use that the best models can boast. It's easy on the eye (if you like the hi-tech look) and is the only model we've looked at that can receive broadcasts on the DAB 'L' band. This means that it will pick up digital radio stations on the Continent that broadcast in this range. The usefulness of this is questionable, however,



because it doesn't take batteries – so it's not the holiday companion it could be. However, it does have a whopping 40 pre-sets, double anything else we tested.

The cheapest Best Buy **Pure (6)** is based on the earlier Evoke-1. Sound quality is good, though you can't turn it up particularly loud and there's only one speaker. As with the Pure (3), you add stereo sound by buying an extra speaker for £30. There's a choice of either maple or cherry finish, and





# DAB AERIALS

If you live in an area with poor digital radio reception, you may find that the standard telescopic aerial that comes with table-top digital radios doesn't pick up a good enough signal. If you experience glitches during broadcasts or you can't pick up all the stations you should be able to, a high-gain external aerial on your roof is your best bet. You can buy one of these aerials for about £30, but if you're not confident about doing lots of cabling, or don't have a head for heights, call in the professionals. The price depends on the logistics of the job, but you can expect to pay about £150 in total. To find an accredited installation specialist, visit www.cai.org.uk or ring 020 8902 8998.

If you're in an area of bad reception and think you'll need an external aerial, check our table to see whether the radio you buy can be connected to one. This Pure will take an external aerial.

### **REWIND LIVE RADIO**

Five of the models we tested, including this Roberts, have built-in memory to record digital radio. This allows you to either pause live radio or skip back through something you've just been listening to.

How much you can record depends on the quality of the broadcast. This is usually



shown in Kbps (128 is normal, 192 is high and 64 is low). The lower the quality, the more that it's possible to record. Some radios can manage to record up to 35 minutes of programming, but expect ten to 20 in most cases.

It's strange to see a 'pause' button on a radio, but it's a definite convenience: you need never again miss those vital goings-on at the Grundys if the doorbell goes during *The Archers*.

it's available for £90 at Argos, Comet, Currys, Dixons and John Lewis.

The old-fashioned leathery appearance of the **Roberts (7)**, £120 from John Lewis, belies its hi-tech innards. You can pause and rewind radio using the PausePlus feature, and close inspection reveals a brightly lit modern-day LCD screen to give your station and signal information. You can use batteries to roam freely, but at 3.3kg it's the heaviest radio on test and not that portable. The two speakers deliver stereo sound but the quality isn't as good as with the best models.

# HAND-HELD

If you like your gadgets small, dark and handsome, the **Sony** (25) (shown below, actual size), £150 from Comet, Currys, Dixons and John Lewis, fits the bill. It packs an FM tuner as well as a digital one inside its diminutive frame so you can always tune in, and it delivers great sound. Battery life was also impressive at 11 hours (digital radios are harder on batteries than analogue ones and usually last about half as long). Our only gripes were that it is fiddly to use, which is admittedly difficult to avoid given its small size, and it has a very dim display which was difficult to read in sunlight.

The **Philips (26)**, £100 from John Lewis, delivers decent sound with the supplied headphones, but it's not as good as the Sony. Sound quality improves considerably if you get some better headphones.

On the plus side, the Philips comes with rechargeable batteries, although they last only seven hours. Still, if you get caught without a mains plug, you can put in some standard AAs. Like the Sony, this Philips comes with an FM tuner as back-up.
