One for all

Why have three machines cluttering up your desk when you can buy just one? We test the latest all-in-one printers

All-in-one printers can print, copy and scan, and some will even allow you to send faxes. This means they're great if you've got limited space in your home. And they're certainly growing in popularity – sales of all-in-one printers rose by 17 per cent between 2005 and 2006. But are they any good at what they do? We put them to the test.

If you're unsure whether to buy an allin-one, work your way through 'Pick me a printer', p56, to help you choose between the many types of printer on offer. Once you know the sort of printer you want, head to www.which.co.uk/ printers_and_scanners and use 'Compare products' to help you to choose a Best Buy. We test printers at regular intervals throughout the year and add the results to our website, where we currently have test results of 96 models.

Best Buy update

None of the models in our latest all-inones test performed well enough to be a Best Buy. So the featured Best Buy, the Samsung SCX-4725FN, p56, is taken from our previous test (see *Computing Which?*, November 2007, p41) – we have checked that it's still available for you to buy.

This Best Buy is a laser model that prints only in black ink. It can't be used to print photos or colour graphics – if you want to print these types of documents, we recommend a colour model on p57.

Software solution

printer to work with either Windows Vista or any Apple Mac, check the printer manufacturer's website to ensure there's a suitable driver (see our 'Jargon buster', opposite) available. We show you how to download and install a driver, opposite.

Are you buying a printer to go with a new computer? Check what operating system (see 'Jargon buster') your computer uses, as you'll need to get the right driver for it. All the printers in the table (p56) are compatible with Windows Vista and Mac OS X.

How we test



Our tests reveal models' print quality and running costs

Our experts assess a typical black text letter, an 8x10-inch photo – in colour and black and white – a spreadsheet, and a document with colour graphics and text. Among other things, they check for sharpness, colour and contrast.

Using new ink cartridges, we print test documents until the printer stops printing. We count the number of pages and use this, plus the cost of each cartridge, to calculate the cost of printing.

Scanning and copying

We scan and copy a magazine page and an 8x10-inch colour photo. We also scan a 3D object to see how well each printer reproduces objects at varying distances from the scan plate.



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Driver dilemma

When you buy a new printer, or if your current model isn't working properly, go to the manufacturer's website and download the most up-to-date driver (see 'Jargon buster', below)



Install your printer following the instruction manual provided – don't connect your printer to your computer until instructed to. Once you've done this, head to your printer manufacturer's website. Here we've used Canon (www.canon.co.uk) as an example of what to expect once you've logged on to the site.

Look for an area on the website called downloads, software support or support. On the Canon website you need to click on the link 'Support'. If you can't find the correct part of the website, look for its search tool – it's usually a box or a link entitled 'Search' – and try typing in 'Driver downloads'.



Click 'Software download', and select your printer type (on the Canon site, all-inone printers are multifunctionals). Select your operating system from the menu, and click 'Submit'. Scroll down, and click the software you want to download. Next, click the file name under 'Software'. Tick 'I accept', click 'Download software' and the driver will install automatically.

CAN YOU SAVE MONEY WITH KODAK?

Kodak's advertising claims its new printers are cheap to run. We tested them and were surprised by the results

In late 2007, Kodak launched two inkjet all-inone printers with a lot of fanfare about how cheap they would be to run. We

were a little sceptical of this at Which? and wanted to test the 5300 and 5500 thoroughly before singing their praises. The results are in and we're really excited by what we've seen.

Despite the fact that the two Kodaks haven't made it as Best Buys – both had poor text quality, for example, and the cheaper 5300 was let down by its photo quality – they live up to their claims of being much cheaper to run than their competitors. Colour A4 photos from the 5300 and the 5500 work out at 21p and 25p, respectively, which is considerably cheaper than any of the other printers in this batch.

Concealed cost

However, there is a potential hidden cost that's worth thinking about. These Kodak printers contain a print head inside the device rather than on the ink cartridge. Once the print head reaches the end of its life it will need to be replaced (other printer brands, including Canon, also use this type of technology). Some brands have the print head in the cartridge, where it gets renewed every time you buy more ink. Kodak claims that the print head is unlikely to need replacing during the lifespan of the printer – we print thousands of pages during the course of testing and it didn't happen during this time.

If the print head stops working in the first year of ownership, Kodak will replace it under the warranty. After that, you pay about £18.50 for Kodak to replace it.

Jargon buster

Don't know the difference between a driver and an operating system? Use our guide

DRIVER Software that allows your computer to communicate with devices such as a printer or a scanner.

• OPERATING SYSTEM The software that manages your computer.

 OPTICAL CHARACTER
RECOGNITION Software that automatically interprets scanned text and outputs it into a text document, such as a Word document, that you can edit.
PICTBRIDGE An industry standard connection technology that directly connects digital cameras and printers.

PRINT HEAD Ink passes through the print head, which is like a very fine sieve, before hitting the page.



Pick me a printer

Use our guide to find the best type of printer for your needs

The most flexible printers are inkjet all-in-ones, as they allow you to copy and scan, and print colour photos and other types of documents. Buy a small photo printer only if you know you just want to print postcard-sized photos. Otherwise opt for a full-sized inkjet, which can print snaps of this size and also A4 photos. If you don't know how much you're going to use your printer, or what you're going to use it for, buy an inkjet all-in-one. Already own a scanner? Then go for a standard inkjet.

This Samsung Best Buy laser all-in-one can print only in black ink, so it's more suited to a home office than if you want to print, say, photos and colour graphics (if you want to do this, see 'Worth considering', opposite).

It has an automatic document feeder (see 'What you should look for', p54) and a fax machine. Plain text document printing is fast and to a high standard. It's cheapest online.

WORTH KNOWING This printer measures 40x44x40cm, so make sure you have room for it before you buy.

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Worth considering

We tell you which model to buy if you want to print photos or colour graphics

The HP Photosmart C5180 (2) didn't make it as a Best Buy, but it's worth considering if you want to print colour documents and photos. Our testers described its printed images as being 'sharp with very good colour'.

One of the reasons this HP is not a Best Buy is because the quality of its text printing is below

average. It's fine for printing emails and web pages, for example, but it's not great if you want to print important documents, such as your CV.
