# How we test

Disposable cameras are cheap but the photos they contain can be priceless – so we test how durable they are

#### **Tipple test**

One of the durability tests we put the cameras through simulates a debauched holiday or party. We dunk the cameras in a pint of beer and see whether they still take photos, and whether previous exposures can be developed. The waterproof cameras passed this test, as you'd expect, but regular models didn't fare so well. All failed to take salvageable shots after being drowned but, apart from the Picstop and Kodak Fun Flash models, some pictures taken beforehand could be developed successfully.

## **Quality snaps**

We assess image quality by shooting charts with geometric patterns to measure aspects such as lens distortion and colour reproduction. We also take real-life snaps and rate the cameras on how well they reproduce skin tones and capture the contrasting colours of flowers in a garden and details on buildings.

## One of our durability tests simulates a debauched holiday or party

The digital revolution changed photography forever, but there's still a place for some throwaway fun with single-use film cameras

There are plenty of reasons you may want a single-use film camera. Perhaps you don't fancy letting the kids loose with your shiny new digital or maybe you want to give out cameras at a party. Single-use cameras also come into their own if you have just got to the airport and realised you forgot to pack your usual camera, or if your memory card is full. Some even let you try out taking photos underwater – useful if you don't want to fork out for an expensive waterproof case or a specialist camera.

To put single-use cameras to the test, we looked at 13 models, including two that can be used underwater. In general, the cameras from established brands, such as Fuji, Kodak and Boots, did better than the own-brand offerings from the likes of Tesco and Woolworths.

All the cameras were easy to use: simply look through the viewfinder, press a button to activate the flash if you need it, and remember to wind the film on for your next shot. The big difference was the quality of the photos they produced – see the table, opposite, for the results.

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#### **Camera comparison**

With most mobile phones capable of taking pictures, we thought it was only right to compare the shots we took with our single-use cameras with a typical phone camera (see 'Phone versus camera', below, for more).

Overall, we found the prints from the cameras were better quality than those from the phone, albeit worse than from proper digital or film cameras. Of course, this is selling the mobile short – you can't instantly send your pictures to a friend's phone or take video clips with a single-use camera. Still, with our Best Buy priced at only £4.97 for 27 exposures, you can afford to have both. Expect to pay around £3 to have pictures developed if you're prepared to wait a few days, or double that for one-hour processing.

# Phone versus camera

Does the growing popularity of camera phones mean you can ditch the disposable? We investigate

#### **Minimal exposure**

The Kodak Ultra Compact was the smallest camera on test, at just 6x10x3cm.

## **Green overtones**

Picstop is one of the few manufacturers that doesn't reuse camera bodies once the photos have been developed. However, many photo processors, including Boots, will recycle the cameras.

# Worth considering

KODAK SPORT (12) £9.99 If you

fancy yourself as a bit of a Jacques Cousteau and want to take pictures underwater, the Kodak Sport was the best camera we tested. There's no flash but the camera has a fast film (800 ISO),



so it works well in low-light conditions. Capable of diving to 15m, this Kodak takes decent photos in and out of water. It's better for close objects than vistas, but that's true of most of the cameras on test. Widely available. WE LIKE This model comes with a chunky film winding knob that's easy to operate above and underwater.
