VCRs NEED TO KNOW

With so many new ways to record TV programmes – from DVD recorders to personal video recorders – it's surprising that the humble VCR is still with us. But although manufacturers are drastically cutting their ranges and retailers such as Dixons are not stocking them, we still managed to find seven new VCRs for our latest test.

RECORDING FROM DIGITAL TV

Some VCRs include features which make recording digital TV easier. For example, they may include Scart link recording, which allows you to program recordings via your set-top box. Other VCRs let you link your settop box to your TV via the VCR (Scart loop through), top box doesn't have an additional Scart output to link directly to the TV. See our table below for VCRs with these features.

BEST BUYS

None of our seven newlytested models is as good as our two previous Best Buys, which, thankfully, are still available.

The previously-tested **Panasonic (1)** is easy to use, has good picture quality in both standard and long play modes and has excellent sound. It's available from Richer Sounds for £80.

As well as playing regular VHS recordings, the **Panasonic (2)** can use S-VHS tapes, which are more expensive but produce better pictures. Our viewing panel gave it a top rating for picture quality and rated it good for sound, too. It's also easy to use. It's no longer available on the high street but you'll find it online for around £150.
