A sound choice

Bring your TV viewing to life with home cinema kits that are big on sound, not price

with seeing the same film in the cinema. A lot of this is to do with the sound.

Speakers placed round the walls of a cinema bombard you with sound giving the impression that you're in the thick of the action. This is an experience that TV speakers fail to reproduce.

A home cinema system tries to recreate the bigscreen experience in your living room. The surroundsound information used by cinemas is also held on DVDs, so a suitable system can decode it and feed it to speakers in your living room. The simplest and cheapest route to home cinema is to buy a kit that contains all you need. A kit usually includes an amplifier, six speakers, cables and, usually, a radio tuner and DVD player.

Some kits offer an option of wireless rear speakers to reduce cabling. We've tested a mixture with and without wireless speakers to get an idea of any shortcomings.

Plunging into the world of home cinema needn't cost a fortune. Our cheapest Best Buy,

the Philips HTS3154 (£140) is more than £450 cheaper than the most expensive home cinema system that we recommend, the Sony DAV-IS10 (£599).



'IT MAKES YOU FEEL MORE INVOLVED'

Lucy Elmes, 26, public relations account executive

Lucy loves watching sports, films and music programmes on TV and DVD, but had never tried a home cinema system. We gave her Panasonic's SC-PT860EB for a month to see how she liked it.

Lucy found the system easy to set up. Cables are colour coded and speaker volumes automatically set. However, she wasn't impressed that the kit didn't include a Scart or HDMI cable, meaning that she had to go back to the shops before hooking it up to her TV.

'To spend over £300 on a home cinema system and then fork out another £20 for a cable is annoying.'

Lucy found the system easy to use with clear instructions. Hooking it up and using an iPod via the docking station was simple as well.

The quality of surround-sound and effects impressed her, the stereo sound less so.

She watched a variety of DVDs and surround-sound programming from Sky and said of the homecinema system: 'It makes you feel more involved.'

But Lucy added: 'Having a home cinema system is a nice addition, but I wouldn't say that it's essential. I'd probably upgrade our TV before splashing out on surround-sound.'

Expert view

Our expert Dave Holes looks at wireless systems and the impact of Blu-ray

Many of us are reluctant to clutter our homes with more cables. Because of this, home cinema systems have evolved with wireless rear speakers out of the box, or as an option.

The longest cables are needed to power the rear speakers, so doing away with these is an attractive idea. With a wireless system you won't need cabling to the amplifier, but you will still need a nearby mains socket and power cables to power your rear speakers.

The rise of high-definition Blu-ray DVD has had an effect on the home cinema market.

A few Blu-ray kits, such as the Samsung HT-BD2R, have

been launched. Even the cheaper kits currently cost close to £1,000, which is probably too much for most of us to afford.

However, prices are already falling and we'll no doubt see Blu-ray become the dominant force in home cinema in a few years.



ON TEST HOME CINEMA



71% JVC TH-D5 £245

This was the clear winner in our tests thanks to great surround-sound effects.

The stereo sound when playing CDs is less impressive, but perfectly acceptable. It also comes with a DVD player and a reasonable FM/AM tuner.

We found this system straightforward to set up and the instructions are relatively easy to follow.

It has both Scart and HDMI outputs and a headphone socket.

There's even a USB input, so you'll be able to attach a memory stick to the system.

The speakers deliver around 10W of output per channel in surround mode – plenty for most rooms. It was cheapest online. WORTH KNOWING DVD picture

quality is excellent but can judder in slow motion or in fast forward.

69% LG HT903TA £300

Stereo and surround-sound from the floorstanding front and rear speakers is good and surround effects are excellent.

Unusually, this has a separate DVD and tuner section that sits on a supplied stand while the amplifier is in the subwoofer.

The DVD player's picture quality is good. You can preset up to 50 FM radio stations and it copes well with weak station signals. However, you won't be able to get AM radio. There's no headphone socket, but you can connect a USB memory stick. It will link to a Sky or Freesat receiver, so you can make the most of surroundsound programmes. Setting speaker distances is confusing, but once set-up, it's quite easy to use. It was cheapest at Argos. WE LIKE It uses very little power in standby, just 0.6 Watts.

69% Philips HTS3154 £140

You don't need to spend a fortune to get decent sound, as this simple Best Buy proves. It delivers good quality and decent surround-sound effects. The amplifier lacks a little power, delivering only about 5W to each speaker. But this is fine for the average living room.

You can preset up to 40 radio stations and there is a USB input for connecting a memory stick. However, there's no digital input so you can't connect it to a Sky box or any other surroundsound source.

The manual is helpful and detailed, making it quite easy to set up. The system was cheapest online when we checked.

69% Pioneer DCS-370 £217

We were impressed by the sound from CDs and DVDs with this system and the surroundsound effects are excellent.

DVD images are clear and slow motion is smooth going forward and back, though a bit too quick in search mode.

There's a Scart and HDMI output as well as a USB port and a headphone socket, but the system lacks a digital input for connecting an external surround-sound source, such as a Sky box. The remote is clearly labelled, but the display is quite hard to read. It was cheapest online when we checked.

WORTH KNOWING Power output in surround mode is

limited, but should be enough for a normal living room.

69% Sony DAV-IS10 £599

If you don't want speakers that dominate your living room, you'll like the Sony's five tiny ones (4.5x5.5x4 cm). These deliver very good surround-sound and acceptable stereo.

The larger than normal subwoofer takes on some of the role normally played by the other speakers, so it's crucial for it to be in the right place. You can't put it below a table, for example, as you can with a more conventional 5.1 system. You get FM and AM radio, and MP3 players can be connected although you will need a Digital Media Port adaptor to be able to do this. It was cheapest at John Lewis when we checked. WE LIKE It consumes little power in standby and in use.

68% Panasonic SC-PT560EB £350

This produces some of the best stereo sound we've heard from a home cinema system. We were also impressed by the surroundsound quality and effect. You can wall-mount the front speakers.

You can link the system to an iPod, there's a headphone socket and a USB input.

The DVD player takes DVD-Ram discs and picture quality is good, but you can't resume watching from where you stopped. You have to set the speaker volumes and delay times manually, but once that is done, the system's easy to use. It was cheapest at Comet when we checked.

WE FOUND Wireless rear speakers cost £100 more. We haven't tested them.

The Samsung HT-X715 produced outstanding stereo and surroundsound in our tests. Surround effects are great, too. We tried it with wireless rear speakers (SWA-4000), that cost £100 more.

Picture quality is good and it also plays DVD-Audio discs. You can hook up a USB-compatible device such as a memory stick, there's a headphone socket and Bluetooth to link it to compatible

SURROUND-SOUND

Home cinema systems deliver surround-sound effects if they're fed with a surround-sound signal. Blu-ray discs and modern DVDs have 5.1 surround information but TV material is limited. Some Sky and Freesat shows have it, but not Freeview. The effect is most obvious in action scenes, but it's also used for ambient effects, such as chatter in a bar.
