Small digital cameras have plenty to offer. They're lightweight and fit in your pocket making them perfect for taking around with you. They're easy to use and take much better quality pictures – sharper, with better colours - than most mobile phones. They also come with lots of settings that give you the chance to be a little more creative or get a good photo that inferior cameras would miss.

They can't do everything - they lack the bigger zooms you'll find on some bigger cameras, for instance, so are no good for taking close-ups of distant objects.

But our Best Buys (all priced at less than £250) feature enough extras to keep most amateur photographers happy.

What you should look for

The Canon Digital Ixus Wireless, for example, has Wi-Fi for wireless transfer of photos straight from your camera to a computer, and the Samsung Digimax i6 PMP can play music and videos downloaded from your computer.

All the small cameras on test can also record video and sound. like a camcorder. and all can be linked to a television. so you can show off your photos and video on a bigger screen.

It's worth knowing that Jessops is currently offering a price guarantee. If you see any product it sells at another online or UK high-street shop cheaper (in the same colour), it will give you 110 per cent of the difference if you buy it from a Jessops store.

66% Samsung Digimax i6 PMP £160

The Samsung Digimax i6 PMP produced the highest-quality pictures of any Best Buy in our test. Colours were consistently accurate and images nice and sharp throughout. However, with a minimum optical zoom setting of 39mm, this is not the camera

to choose if you want to shoot panoramic views (the Canon Best Buys are better options for this). The i6 PMP



(also available in black) doubles up as a music/video player and is supplied with earphones. Sound quality is good and video quality reasonable, but battery life is very limited for both music and video playing. The Digimax i6 PMP is available from Argos.

WATCH OUT The software to transfer video and music from camera to computer works with Windows XP but not Apple Macintosh computers.

a range – for example, 35-105mm. The higher the second number, the further you can zoom in for shooting more distant objects. The lower the first number, the more you can zoom out – good for indoor shots in cramped conditions

SHUTTER DELAY

When you press the button, there is a brief 'shutter delay' before the camera takes the shot. To get round this, half-press the button, then, when the camera has focused, compose your picture and press fully

The Canon Digital Ixus 65 can take two shots a second in 'burst mode', so is great for action photography. It also powers up in under two seconds, so you should never miss a photo opportunity. Picture quality is good, and movie quality is one of the best we've seen on a digital camera. Scene modes (pre-set options) include

indoor, snow, beach and underwater conditions. For the underwater mode, you'll need an optional waterproof

case. This allows you to take photos down to a depth of 40 metres, but it's expensive at £150. It is widely available. **WE FOUND It has one of the biggest LCD screens (60x45mm) we've seen.**

65% Canon Digital Ixus Wireless £175

If you have Wi-Fi on your computer, this camera is for you. As well as allowing you to transfer photos wirelessly and print wirelessly from up to a few metres away using the supplied adaptor, you can control the lxus Wireless via computer. This remote control feature is potentially useful for taking shots of animals and birds where you can't get close without frightening them away. Movie quality is very good, but the LCD screen itself is the smallest on test. It is available from Comet, Jessops and Woolworths.

WORTH KNOWING For wireless computer transfer, make sure your computer runs Windows XP SP2 or Mac OS X v10.4.

Digital camera basics

When you take a photo with a digital camera, it is stored on the camera's internal memory or on a memory card. You can then review the photo you've just taken using the LCD screen, and delete it if you're not happy with it.

Another plus is that you can print as many or as few of your photos as you want. You can print them yourself using a home printer (either with or without a computer – for Best Buy printers see 'Small can be beautiful', *Which?*, July 2006, p60) or take your memory card to a shop to have it done there. Sharing photos is also easier with digital cameras – after transferring them to



computer you can email them to friends or upload them to online photo-sharing sites. Many of these websites also offer photo-printing services. You choose which of your photos you want printed, pay online, and your prints arrive within a few days.

Computers also let you explore the versatility of digital photography – with imageediting software you can edit photos, fix red eye, crop, improve colours and more.

Jargon buster

All the models have a macro mode and PictBridge. Some have image stabilisation, too

■ IMAGE STABILISATION Once the preserve of big cameras, this helps you achieve sharper pictures, especially in dim light.

■ ISO The higher the ISO number, the more sensitive the camera is to light, helping you achieve blur-free pictures without flash. You have the option to set ISO manually on all this month's cameras, but the higher you set it, the more 'noise' you get in your photos. This appears as small, coloured speckles, and it can detract from picture quality.

MACRO MODE Indicated by a little flower icon (below), macro mode lets you take detailed close-ups of flowers, insects and so on.
MEGAPIXELS Pixels are the tiny dots of colour that, when put



together, make up a digital image. For a top quality 7x5-inch print, you need a camera with at least 3.2 megapixels – that's 3.2 million pixels, expressed also as 3.2Mp. For a top-quality 10x8-inch print, aim for 7.2Mp.

PICTBRIDGE Connect your camera to a PictBridge printer and you can print your photos at home without using a computer at all. You can also print from your camera's memory card to a home printer without a computer if your printer has a memory card slot.
VIEWFINDER This is the little window you put your eye against to look through – only a few small cameras have one but it can be useful when composing an image if the LCD screen is hard to view –

for example, in bright sun.

65% Sony Cybershot DSC-T9 £235

The sleek Sony Cyber-shot T9 is one of the few cameras on test with image stabilisation, which is a useful feature for helping to avoid blurry pictures.

Image quality is good – it missed out on winning a four-star rating in our test by a narrow margin. Movie

quality, on the other hand, isn't so great, and there's no movie zoom either. Its LCD screen, although not the biggest, is the best of all the Best Buys. The Cyber-shot DSC-T9 is available from Argos and Jessops.

WORTH KNOWING The T9 takes MS Duo memory cards. These are a little more expensive than SD cards.

Fractionally larger than the T9, the Sony Cyber-shot DSC-W50 has more conventional looks. Like its brother, it lets you adjust the strength of its flash manually if you prefer – handy if you find your flash photos are coming out

too bright, for example. As an alternative, try turning the flash off and setting the ISO to 1,000, the highest setting available on any of our Best Buys. The higher the ISO, the more chance your photo will be blur free in poor light. It is widely available. WE LIKE As with the Canon Digital Ixus Wireless, there's a viewfinder

as well as an LCD screen.

Most cameras come with a small internal memory, so buy a card with a larger capacity

Accessories

Your digital camera's box will contain all you need to start taking photos. However, there are a few extras that you should consider buying

■ MEMORY CARD Most cameras come with a small internal memory for storing your pictures, or a smallcapacity memory card, usually 16 megabytes (16MB). This has enough space for only a handful of pictures, so buy a large-capacity memory card allowing you to store more. A 256MB card, for example, holds around 85 6Mp photos, and costs from under £10. Make sure you buy the right type – most of the cameras here take SD cards.

 CASE A case is a worthwhile investment. From around £10, it will help protect your camera and memory card from damage.
SUPPORT Putting your camera on a tripod helps you take sharper pictures. Full-sized tripods cost £15 upwards. You can also get minitripods for greater portability.

Two lenses

The Kodak EasyShare V570 has two lenses that you can switch between. One has a 39-117mm optical zoom range; the other is fixed at 23mm, which is great for distant, zoomed-out shots.

Long shutter delay

The Pentax Optio T10 has the longest shutter delay – 1.4 seconds.

End-of-line models

These two Best Buys are getting hard to find in many shops but are worth tracking down before they disappear



5.0Mp CANON DIGITAL IXUS 55 £260 (WITH 128MB MEMORY CARD) JOHN LEWIS The Canon Digital Ixus 55 is similar to the more widely available lxus 65 (2). It has a smaller LCD screen (49x37mm against 60x45mm), but has a viewfinder, too - and the same optical zoom range as the 55. The maximum ISO setting is lower at 400 and it has 5Mp instead of 5.9Mp, but this is still a top performer. Shutter delay is just 0.3 seconds - one of the shortest in this size category - so it is good for taking action shots. **SCORE 65%**



5.0Mp SONY CYBER-SHOT DSC-T5 £200 ARGOS Like the more

expensive Best Buy Sony Cyber-shot DSC-T9 (4), this is a very slimline camera. It weighs a bit less than the T9 at just 135g but lacks the latter's image stabilisation. Its maximum ISO setting is lower at 400, and the megapixel count is lower, too, at 5.0Mp. It has the same optical zoom range as the T9, though, and the shutter delay is better. It also offers slightly better movie quality than the T9, but both cameras lack any kind of movie zoom. **SCORE 64%**

Taking pictures at Christmas parties

Some tips for great party snaps



AVOID FLASH Try not to use flash if possible – colours can look unnatural. It usually doesn't flatter people, and can even agitate some.

USE ISO Manually adjust your ISO to a higher setting instead. Be aware that this can introduce more 'noise' (see 'Jargon buster', p67).

■ BREATHE OUT Try to press the shutter button just as you've breathed out. Your body is at its most relaxed and still at this point, helping to keep the camera as still as possible for sharp, blur-free photos. Try to pause for a moment after pressing the button: moving immediately can cause blurring.

KEEP YOUR DISTANCE

If flash is necessary, make sure your subject isn't too close, but within a maximum of a few metres of the camera. On some cameras, you can adjust the strength of the flash. Also, use red-eye reduction mode.

CANDID CAMERA If you think your subjects won't mind being photographed without them knowing, try taking a few unposed shots.

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Bigger cameras

If you want a bigger camera with more features, here is what you can get for your money

If you have a larger budget, it is worth considering buying a bigger digital camera. These often have a higher specification, a more powerful zoom and more features, allowing you to take better quality photographs and to be a bit more creative. We'll take a closer look at these in our April 2007 report.

Digital SLR (DSLR) cameras, with interchangeable lenses, are the choice of professionals and keen amateurs. Sony has recently launched its first, the Sony A100, commonly sold with an 18-70mm lens (£550 for both). This body-and-lens combination performs significantly better than the small cameras we've looked

at this month – its total score is 72 per cent. However, it falls a little short of our DSLR Best Buys. Go to www.which. co.uk/digitalcameras to find out more about the Sony A100 and eight other DSLRs.

All the cameras we tested can record movies and sound, turning your camera into a mini-camcorder. Although a decent dedicated camcorder beats even the best digital camera for movie quality, a good movie mode option on a digital camera can be a worthwhile alternative for taking the odd clip.

With most cameras you can zoom during filming, although usually with digital zoom rather than optical zoom. Using digital zoom, as when taking still photos, reduces image quality, especially when you zoom in a long way.

Footage is stored on the memory card or internal memory. Bear in mind that recording movies can take up a lot of memory space, especially



card to have space for just over two minutes of footage. On a few cameras some quality settings restrict the length of movie clip, even if there is memory space available.

To watch your video on a bigger screen, you can connect your camera to a TV with the supplied cable. Then, put the camera into playback mode (normally depicted by a little arrow). You might need to adjust your TV's settings at this point to be able to display the video from the camera. You can also view your video on a computer monitor (in fact, camera video often looks better on computer). Transfer your video to computer, as you would still photos, using the USB cable supplied or with a memory card reader.
