Holiday health alert

Which?, June 2006, p12 I appreciate that your article arises from the experiences of your members. However, to categorise many of the Baltic States as low risk worries me, as does your omission of two tick-borne diseases that are now endemic there.

The first is Lyme disease, which is curable but can be very serious if not treated effectively. There were 10.000 cases in Sweden in 2004. The second is tick-borne encephalitis (TBE), a viral disease for which immunisation is available but for which no effective treatment exists once you've been infected about 12 per cent of those who get it end up with permanent neurological or mental disabilities. It's present in many western and central European countries but my main experience relates, again, to Sweden, where 130 cases were reported in 2005.

In Europe, the medical authorities are generally keen to immunise their own citizens but do not extend their programmes effectively to non-native speakers. Naturally

These TVs have an inherent picture delay of 40 to 80 milliseconds, but manufacturers fail to make up for this when it comes to sound. The delay is even more pronounced when you connect the TV to a hi-fi.

I realise I'm a professional 'techie', but just because the average viewer doesn't know what causes the delay doesn't mean they don't find it annoying. Just watch Wimbledon for the sound of the ball before you see it hit!

Most large insurance companies have voluntarily agreed to hear them, but the majority of independent financial advisers have refused.
